Curriculum Links

- Understand historical concepts such as continuity and change, cause and consequence, similarity, difference and significance, and use them to make connections, draw contrasts, analyse trends, frame historically-valid questions and create their own structured accounts, including written narratives and analyses.
- Understand the methods of historical enquiry, including how evidence is used rigorously to make historical claims, and discern how and why contrasting arguments and interpretations of the past have been constructed.
- Gain historical perspective by placing their growing knowledge into different contexts, understanding the connections between local, regional, national and international history; between cultural, economic, military, political, religious and social history; and between short- and long-term timescales.

Our education visits cost \pounds 5 per child. Any teachers and helpers attend free of charge.

Teachers may also arrange a free pre-visit to the museum to help plan the visit.

You are not limited to our opening days, a visit can be arranged for any day of the working week as long as there is availability.

An indoor room is available to be used for lunches and to store bags, but we have lots of picnic tables and outdoor space for you to use should the weather permit it. You are also very welcome to enjoy our play area!
